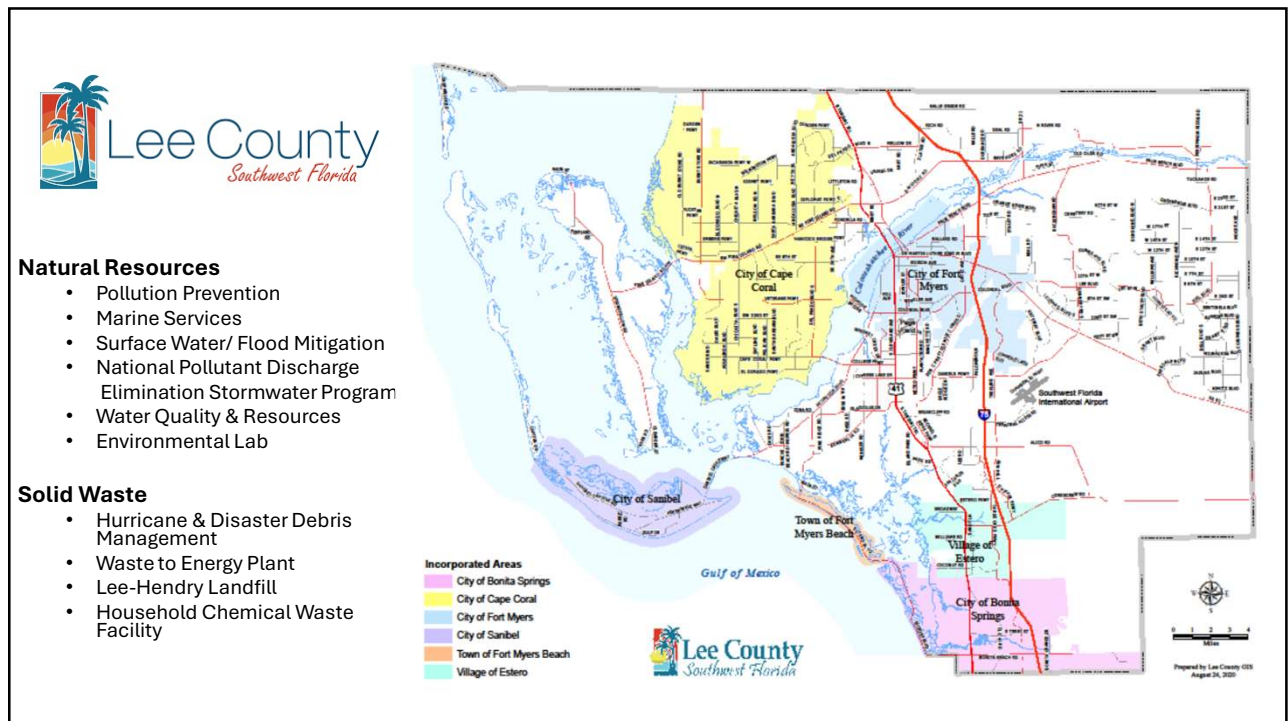

## Pollution Prevention Program Hurricane Responsibilities

### Before the Storms

- Work to remind businesses in flood prone areas to store waste properly and schedule pick up prior to hurricane season during routine assessments.
- Remind all businesses to do proper preparation as storms approach

## After the Storms: Debris Cleanup Contractor Encampments

- Educate contractors on proper management of regulated wastes generated from maintenance activities due to length of cleanup and use of heavy equipment and hauling trucks
- Inform contractors of state requirements for proper reporting for releases and spills of used oils and hazardous wastes
- Make recommendation for proper disposal of solid wastes generated from living and maintenance activities at encampment locations
- Addressed unsanitary conditions from living arrangement of contractors/subcontractors

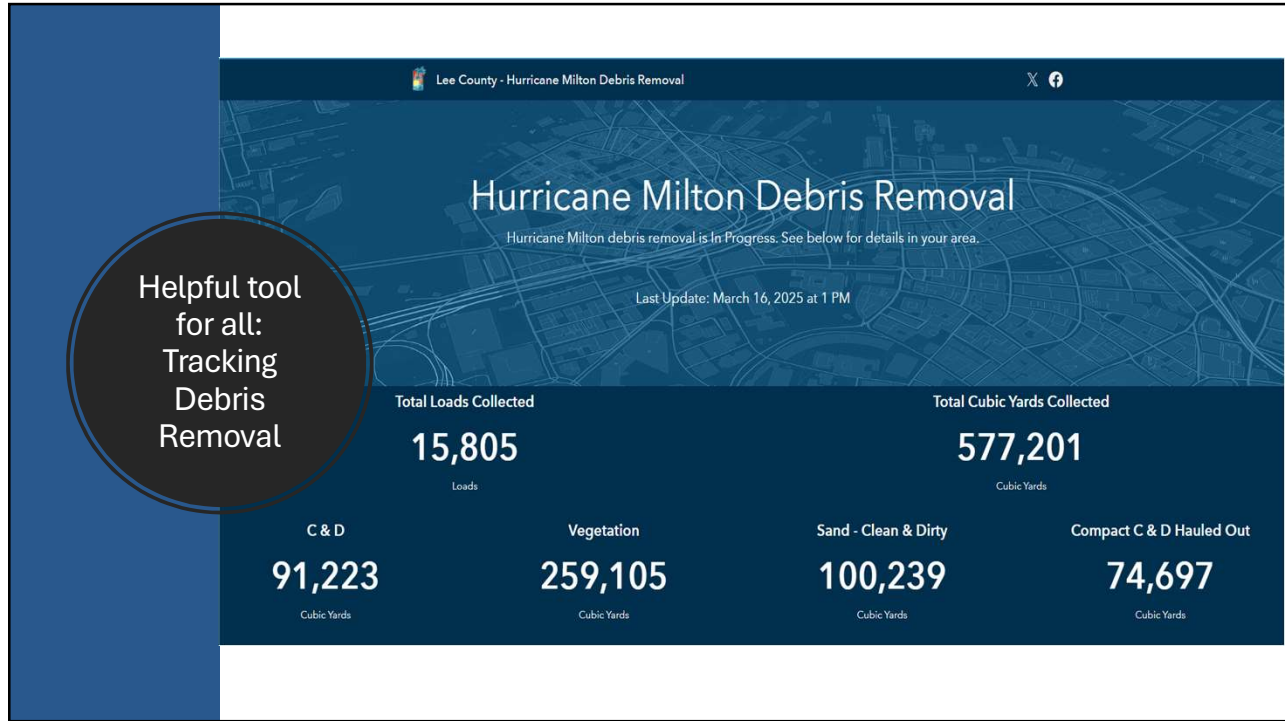


## Hurricane Ian

- Managing HCW in 6.3 million cubic yards of storm debris
  - 462 tons of HCW collected curbside
  - 710,782lbs dropped off within 6 months at our HCW facility
- Ammo disposal
  - Partnership with Sheriff's office (roughly 6 tons)– FDEM
  - Lee County SW – Additional 6972lbs ammo

---

- Florida Department of Emergency Management –FDEM had missions to work on the removal of displaced vessels.
- In Hurricane Ian FWC estimated over 7,000 vessels were displaced.
- When calls were received on vessels leaking fluids, we worked with our Marine Services section to find FDEM contacts to assist in following up on the complaints received.
